On the following pages, your editor reminisces about DXing and helping with medical emergencies. I sure hope that in the future my REDXA friends will take the time to shore their stories of ham radio (and other topics).



On a Saturday afternoon many years ago I was at California Memorial Stadium in Berkeley watching a football game when my cell phone rang. It was hard to understand much that the caller had to say over the crowd noise, but he identified himself as Bernie, W3UR, the DX editor of QST magazine. He wanted a favor. I told him that I'd call him back in a few minutes—after the game.

Outside the stadium, in the relative calm, I called Bernie and received an interesting assignment. No, I wasn't in line for the DX Hall of Fame. Instead, Bernie thought that my medical and ham radio credentials made me suited to help another ham in distress.

Turns out that ham-in-distress was a woman who was sailing in the South Pacific when she developed a medical problem and wanted advice on what to do. I had the frequency she was supposed to be on and her location in the Solomon Islands. So I pointed the beam toward H40 and tried to make contact. The best I could say was there was "something" there but nothing that I could understand. So, I recruited my friend and fellow DXpeditioner Arnie, N6HC (also a physician). He was a little closer to her (Southern California vs my Norcal) and was able to get a better history.

She was also anchored just off a rural village, but, alas, the place was deserted as the residents were all off on some sort of pilgrimage.

The emergency was that she had developed a thick, crusty, weeping facial rash that wasn't going away. We learned that there had been no obvious exposure to any sort of chemical irritant and that except for the rash she wasn't feeling that sick. A few hours later, we received a faxed photo of the rash. It was pretty bad. The differential diagnosis came down to whether this was either an infection or some sort of allergic response. Not being sure, I decided that the worst possibility to miss would be an infection. We

In short order, the French physician was able to determine that this was an allergic response to the antimalarial pills she had been taking (malaria is a BIG problem in the Solomons). After a few days of treatment with prednisone, the rash began to clear and the woman enjoyed her status as an honored guest of the *Marine Nationale*. She was wined (French of course) and dined with special meals.

When she was pronounced cured, the same young officer who brought her to the ship used the ships hel-icopter to fly her back to her sailboat. And that's where the story ends for me . I've asked Bernie and Ar-nie if they had anything to add to the story, but, sadly, they did not record the name or callsigns.

So I missed my chance to be a ham radio hero.

My friend Garry, NI6T, did get a chance to use ham radio to help with a medical emergency without the help of the *Marine Nationale*.

In 1960 Garry, K2RQC, was 18 year-old student, working on summer vacation job writing ad copy for Lafayette Radio in Jamaica Queens NY. One day in early July, Garry was tuning across 15 meters when he heard a call from ZP5CF who was asking for help with an emergency. ZP5CF was operating outside of the USA 15 meter phone band and was being QRMed by several other Spanish speaking stations. So Garry took a chance and QSYed to ZP5CF's frequency and with his full 150 watts (two 6146s as Garry recalls) and asked the QRMers to stand by. It worked.

ZP5CF, Doctor Federico Donna, didn't speak English, but Garry spoke enough Spanish to learn that Dr. Donna was desperately seeking a supply of the drug *Aramine*. Aramine was required for one Colonel Cottone. Garry agreed to help.

Aramine (generic metaraminol) is a vasopressor, a drug that is used to raise blood pressure. Its principle use today is to counteract the dangerous low blood pressure that can sometimes follow the use of spinal anesthesia. Garry doesn't know exactly why Col. Cottone needed the drug.

So, is there a moral to these stories? I'd say "yes". They both demonstrate that even these days with the Internet and satphones, DXers can also provide essential emergency service, spanning thousands of miles in the process.
