## **REDXA President's Commentary**

This is your editor at the keyboard. There's no President's commentary this month (unless one is received before I finish typing this) so I'll do my best to fill in.

President Bill, WX6B, is alive and well. I received email from him that mentioned that he was pouring the concrete for a new foundation as part of the long process of recovering from the fires of October.

Saraj, KU6F, has a new home in Bennett Valley complete with a K3 connected to a random wire hanging out the window . According to

the latest issue of QST, Saraj and I took first place in the 2017 SSB Sweepstakes. She can hang the plaque on her new wall. Our first place plaque for the 2014 event was reduced to cinders and blobs of brass in the great fire.

And Doug, WW6D, our other REDXA fire victim, has a new home and is on the air (thanks for the points in the VHF contest!).

2018 has seen a revolution in HF operating modes. FT8 appears to have taken the bands by storm. Is this a good thing?

On most mornings, I turn my antennas to the west and work into Asia, Australia, and Southern Africa on CW or SSB. Lately, however, I've noticed a dramatic drop in activity in those modes. But, if I tune to 7074—the designated FT8 frequency there are wall-to-wall signals out of Asia.

Yesterday I fired up the rig on 40 M FT8, called CQ, and then had to run back into the house to answer the land line. When I returned to the shack, the WSJT-X screen (WSJT-X is the suite of sound card modes that includes FT8) informed me that I had a completed QSO with a station in Indonesia. It was all automatic right down to the 73 and the only details were the Indonesian station's call and grid square. I don't know the Indonesianaham's name, what sort of equipment he or she might be using, or how was the weather in Jakarta.

So, I'm a bit conflicted. On the one hand, when I get on the air I want to make QSOs and at certain times FT8 is really the only thing happening. On the other hand, unless the QSO represents some sort of ATNO (a new country on "digital" or maybe a new state on 6 meters) I find it strangely unsatisfying because it's so automatic.

Your take on FT8 may differ. I recently exchanged email with the WriteLog developers, asking why their software didn't include a check-off for



FT8. The answer was "WriteLog is a contest programs' and that is why they won't support FT8. The inference is that FT8 isn't a contest mode. The WriteLog developers might need to take another look: during last weekend's ARRL VHF contest the majority of QSOs were by FT8.

Enough of this. Please join us for Field Day at the Marin Rod and Gun site. Set-up begins on the morning of Friday, June 22. We should have three stations—CW, SSB, and GOTA. GOTA, the "get on the air" station for those who are relatively new to ham radio, may even include FT8!

Thanks for the bandwidth.

## BANNED COUNTRIES

Most amateurs are vaguely aware that there are certain countries they are not supposed to work, but there is some uncertainty as to why, and which countries are involved. First, let us say it has nothing to do with the "cold war" or the state of diplomatic relations between these countries on the one hand and the U.S. and Canada on the other. Neither do our own administrations take the initiative in placing a country on the banned list.

It originates with Article 42, Section 1 of the Radio Regulations attached to the Atlantic City Convention of 1947<sup>1</sup> which says:

"Radiocommunications between amateur stations of different countries shall be forbidden if the administration of one of the countries concerned has notified that it objects to such radiocommunications."

The United States and Canada, as signatories to the Convention, would not be living up to their treaty obligations if they did not publish and enforce, among their amateurs, the provisions of this section.

Unfortunately, some of the countries have worded their notices to the I.T.U. somewhat ambiguously. The U.S. interpreted these one way,

the Canadian government the other. Another country notified the U.S. Department of State that it no longer objected to international amateur communications, but did not notify Geneva or Ottawa. Thus, we have the slightly confusing situation of one banned list for Canada, and another for the U.S.!

## Canada

Canadian amateurs may not work amateurs in the following countries: Laos, Cambodia, Viet Nam, Indonesia, Thailand, Roumania, and Jordan.

## United States

The U.S. version of the list comprises Laos, Cambodia, Viet Nam and Indonesia.

You all may remember Phil as active in the 90's and then devoted more of his attention to the MARS organization. He was responsible for the Field Day AC power for many years.

The FD category that we are hoping to activate is 3A but we currently need a "band caption" for that 3<sup>rd</sup> station. Please contact Ron to help out. Bill WX6B has a trailer for us to use for FD and will work with Fred N6YEU on the preloading since all the various antennas, coax, power cables, etc. are stored at Fred's house.

The program for the evening was an impromptu discussion of current DXpeditions and a recap of various observations from the Visalia DX Convention held last month. Take away's were: 1) Lots of comments and empathy for the Bouvet DXpedition, 2) trend toward SDR based transceivers as opposed to the older superhet technology, 3) handling noise especially in urban environments, and 4) the observation of less vendors' displays this year compared to last year's. (However, the big players, like last year, were ICOM, Elecraft, FlexRadio, Yaesu and Ham Radio Outlet.)

The raffle was won by Ron N6IE, who received \$40 and the club \$41. Meeting adjourned at 8:45pm.
