

REDXA President's Commentary

The election drama is behind us for the most part. Hopefully REDXA elections will go smooth and a new President will be elected. The COVID pan-demic is still with us as fall has officially arrived. The cooler temps and forecasts of precipitation are welcome in our neck of the woods. It sure was cold Monday morning lowering the Rohn 50' pushup mast that was holding up one end of the 80M inverted L.

REDXA BOD approved a one-time move of our club center for the ARRL Sweepstakes contest. We are competing for the coveted Sweepstakes gavel in the local club category which has a 35-mile radius and 10 log limitation. Moving the epicenter picks up N6ZFO's points from Lake County, but unfortunately it drops the Marin members. We'll move the center back to Petaluma after the SS SSB contest.

I made a 2 element Shared Apex loop for 80M, it performed fantastic on the receive end and using the 80M Inverted L over a Folded Counterpoise on transmit. I worked close to 100 stations on 80 with the combination, including all of the East coast from Maine to Florida. I also saw an RBN spot for me in EA8 in the Canary Islands.

The REDXA YouTube channel is getting plenty of activity. Frank, W3LPL's presentation is very popular world-wide, with well over 2000 hits from all



Not radio [*it's radio now that I've added his ham radio vanity plate—ed.*] but here's an update on my 190SL roadster project.

I met my goal of finishing the body work and getting the bare metal body painted before winter.

It was close as I missed a lot of time first with the weather well over 100 degrees for weeks on end then with all the unhealthy air quality that followed.

Fortunately the air cleared so I could get back to work and the first few days of November were ideal for painting with mid to high 70's.

On Thursday November 5th I painted the car with 2 wet coats of epoxy primer. I was very relieved as the weather forecast came true with windy low 60's and drizzle starting on Friday the 6th. There won't be any warm weather now before Spring.

I should have it running in the next few weeks then finish wiring and reassembly to be ready for finish paintwork next year.



Palmyra Atoll National Wildlife Refuge and six other national wildlife refuges are seemingly just dots near the equator of the Pacific Ocean, but upon a closer look these islands, islets, and atolls are at the epicenter of Pacific Remote Islands Wildlife

National Monument, the largest marine conservation area in the world. These refuges host terrestrial and marine life in numbers and unique and specialized life forms beyond our imagination and they provide a safe haven for millions of birds and marine life that swarm to shallow areas and islands to rest, to feed, to mate, and to give life to their off-spring.

Located a 1,000 miles south of Hawaii, Palmyra Atoll is one of the most spectacular marine wilderness areas on Earth. The Nature Conservancy bought Palmyra in 2000 from the Fullard-Leo family, who had previously turned down offers to have the atoll used as a nuclear waste site and a casino.

Today, Palmyra is a national marine monument and the Conservancy and the [U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service](#) are partnering to protect it. Through the [Palmyra Atoll Research Consortium](#), it is also being developed as a center for scientific study. What we can learn at Palmyra—about global climate change, coral reefs, marine restoration and invasive species—promises to inform conservation strategies for island ecosystems throughout the Pacific and around the world. It's also the site of a double murder in 1974, chronicled in Vincent Bugliosi's "And the Sea Will Tell".

PUBLIC NOTICE

In view of the severity of the present

Epidemic of Influenza

and in order that all efforts may be concentrated on the stamping out of the disease, the local Board of Health, after consultation with Kingston Medical Society and the Mayor, has enacted that after Oct. 16th, and until further notice,

1. Theatres and Moving Picture Houses shall be closed and remain closed
2. Churches and Chapels of all denominations shall be closed and remain closed on Sundays.
3. All Schools, Public or Private, including Sunday Schools, shall close and remain closed.
4. Hospitals shall be closed to visitors.
5. No public shall be admitted to courts except those essential to the prosecution of the cases called.
6. The Board advises the public most strongly not to crowd into street cars and to avoid as much as possible any crowded train or an assembly of any kind.

Provisions have been made by the Kingston Medical Society whereby all cases applying for assistance will receive the same either by registered practitioners or by final year medical students acting under instructions. Therefore every case of illness should send in a call to a physician.

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
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

We were there. for 9 days. One good/ bad thing there was no cell service/ internet where our camp was. Not being a hunter myself I had to bring something to entertain myself. Yes that would be my trusty ham radio gear. I brought my IC-7300 and home brew linked Dipole which I held up with a Spider Pole inverted vee style at 24 ft. apex.

While I didn't spend a huge amount of time on the air it was reassuring to know I could get on and call for help if an emergency came up. I checked into "The Noontime Net" a few times. (7283.5) I asked if someone could make a phone call for me and Ralph-

N3ZB in Montana offered to do that for me. We moved off frequency and he called my wife Debbie at home and put her on speaker phone so I got to enjoy a short talk with her and to let her know we were all ok in camp. Pretty cool!

I also gave out a few qsos for the Parks on the Air program for park K-4474. I had 3 cw qsos on 20m in the Illinois QSO Party, several 40 cw rag chews, did one CWT contest (1900-2000 utc 20meters) and made 16 qsos in CQWW-Phone including 6 JAs. Considering my qth was in a narrow river canyon surrounded by steep mountains I was amazed I could even be heard.

I always enjoy operating portable, if not CQP then incorporating ham radio in my travels. Great fun!

**"FLU" MASKS
CAN EASILY BE
MADE AT HOME**

The Oakland Chapter of the Red Cross has issued the following instructions for the home construction of influenza masks:

- 1—Take a piece of gauze a yard square.
- 2—Cut this into strips 9 inches wide.
- 3—Fold each strip into halves, then into thirds, making ten thicknesses of gauze.
- 4—Turn in one edge and stick all four sides to hold firm. Mask now measures seven inches by six.
- 5—Put three planks in seven-inch ends, leaving slight depressions about two to allow room for nose.
- 6—Attach a strip 11 inches long to each of the two lower corners. Attach a strip 14 inches long to each of the two upper corners.
- 7—Fastenish mouth by a black thread.

A GAUZE MASK IS 99% PROOF AGAINST INFLUENZA

Doctors wear them. Those who do not wear them get sick. The man or woman or child who will not wear a mask now is a dangerous slacker.

**DIRECTIONS
FOR USING
"FLU" MASK**

Mask should be worn with the same side out.

If mask is used for preventive purposes only, be sure to boil it every night for ten minutes in clear water.

If mask is used in sick room caring for influenza patient, you should have two at least, changing every two or three hours, and boiling for ten minutes in clear water.

In taking care of the patient, the nurse should wear a coverall apron, and take it off before leaving the room. On entering the room the apron should be put on again.
